



By 2050, more than half of all Californians will be Latino






Good News!

Bad News!



• The recession for Latinos and African Americans is not over!



Bad News continued



 Blacks and Latinos have lost more economic ground than whites

The gap in economic security between people of color and whites has widened.



Bad News continued



The economic security of Latinos and Blacks lags behind whites' in good times and often falls faster in bad times when we consider data on employment, wages, income, health insurance coverage, retirement plan participation, homeownership, or poverty rates.





The Up Side

- In California, Latino market share tops 18%
 - > Largest Latino market in the US
- \$249 billion annually
 - > 408% increase over 1990
- 15% of CA businesses are Latinoowned
 - > But 36.6% of the population is Latino

• Will Green jobs close the disparity gap on wages, income, health insurance, retirement plan participation and poverty?

Recommendation #1

Track the data. Consider legislation if agencies refuse to cooperate.







- Utilities currently spending \$740m with Latino-owned businesses
 - > Only 5.5% of total spend





Creating Green Wealth in the Latino Community

- Green Jobs is more than blue collar iobs.
- Latinos deserve to be Green Business Owners as well.
- Latinos should be Green Venture Capitalists.
- Latinos should be the engineers and scientists developing green technologies.
- Latinos should be homeowners that can afford the Hybrid vehicle and solar panels.



Recommendation #2



Ownership and assetbuilding are essential. Don't just focus on blue collar jobs.





The Community's Challenge to the Caucus

- Engage renewable energy sector
 - > First Solar
 - Only one Latino on the board. No Latinos on executive staff.
 - Solyndra
 - \$500m ARRA loan guarantee to build new Fremont plant
 - No diversity commitments
 - Millions in profits from ratepayerfunded renewable contracts







Engage the private sector. Leverage public subsidies, loans, tax breaks, to facilitate discussions.





The Community's Challenge to the Caucus

- When CA taxpayer or ratepayer dollars are involved, recipient companies must have public commitments to diversity
 - > Workforce diversity (Green Jobs)
 - Supplier diversity (Green Business Owners)
 - Management and board diversity (High Level Executive Positions)





The Community's Challenge to the Caucus

• Green regulators like CEC & ARB should set GO 156-like (diversity) goals for the companies they regulate.






Recommendation #4

- Green Investments should target those most harmed by pollution.
 - Those facing disproportionate financial hardship in going green
 - Investments should target areas with high unemployment and high pollution
 - AB 1405: Community Benefits Fund (DeLeon and Perez)





Public Policy Principles

- Ensure agencies are tracking data jobs going to Latinos
- Direct investments to underserved areas that suffer most from climate change
- Keep Jobs in California
- Ensure low and moderate income households see real energy savings
- Ensure that small businesses receive real incentives that enable them to compete with big business.
- Measure air quality on a regular basis in Latino communities to ensure real health impacts
- Engage Philanthropic leaders
